

Bengal's First: ACL Reconstruction with Biological Augmentation at Woodlands

Faster healing, smarter rehab – bringing athletes and active professionals back to action sooner


For countless athletes, an ACL tear feels like a full stop. At Woodlands Multispeciality Hospital, it just became a comma. In a state-first, our orthopaedic team has performed **arthroscopic ACL reconstruction with a biological augmentation implant** on a 31-year-old patient – an innovation designed to **accelerate graft healing and bone integration** and potentially **shorten return-to-sport timelines to about three months** in selected cases.

"The biological scaffold accelerates graft maturation and reduces inflammation, enabling a significantly quicker and more confident return to physical activity," – **Dr Arnab Karmakar**, consultant, orthopaedic surgery, Woodlands Hospital Ltd.

Unlike conventional ACL reconstruction (where recovery can stretch to 9-12 months), this technique pairs minimally invasive arthroscopy with a **bioactive scaffold** that supports the body's own repair. The science is simple yet powerful: nurture the graft early, integrate it better, and the knee—and confidence—can recover faster.

The implications for sport are profound. Long layoffs erode muscle, morale, and momentum. A shorter, **protocol-driven rehab window** – guided by sports physiotherapy and regular objective assessments—can help athletes reclaim form while reducing the risk of re-injury through staged loading, neuromuscular training, and sport-specific drills.

At Woodlands, this milestone reflects our larger philosophy: **precision surgery, personalised rehab, multidisciplinary oversight**



– from imaging to theatre to the turf. For those sidelined by knee injury, it's the clearest signal yet: the comeback can start sooner.



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From Crash to Comeback

Against impossible odds, Anupam rides again – powered by his grit and Woodlands' integrated team approach

It was drizzling softly on July 26, 2024, as Anupam Bhattacharya, a 55-year-old logistics entrepreneur, cautiously rode his Bajaj Vikrant motorcycle across Vidyasagar Setu towards Kolkata. Unbeknownst to him, his life was about to drastically change. Suddenly, a sand-laden truck, attempting to dodge civic volunteers, swerved violently into Anupam's path. Utilizing instincts honed from his expertise in bike stunts, Anupam deliberately slid his bike to avoid a direct collision. Tragically, a second vehicle, possibly a mini truck, ran over him moments later.



Anupam's injuries were catastrophic: severe limb trauma with exposed bones, crushed pelvis, broken ribs, extensive soft tissue damage, and significant internal bleeding. Initially taken to a government hospital, doctors suggested limb amputations were inevitable. Rejecting this grim prognosis, Anupam swiftly transferred to Woodlands Hospital – a choice he calls "the best decision of my life."

At Woodlands, an expert multidisciplinary team led by orthopaedic surgeon Dr Kalyan Kumar Guha, plastic surgeon Dr Anupam Golash, neurologist Dr Deep Das, neurosurgeon Dr Ajay Agarwal, critical care specialist Dr Susmita Debnath, general surgeon Dr Darius Anklesaria, pathologist Dr DN Mukherjee, and anaesthetists Dr Asis Kumar Patra and Dr Debjani Ray immediately sprang into action. Over 20 intense days, Anupam underwent eight consecutive surgeries, including internal and external bone fixations, extensive soft tissue reconstructions, and critical neurological interventions to control brain bleeding and respiratory complications.

Remarkably, against steep odds, Anupam not only survived but made a complete recovery. Today, a year later, he is fully mobile, back at home in Behala, and confidently riding his motorcycle again. His remarkable journey of resilience and Woodlands' medical excellence serves as a powerful testament to the human spirit and the transformative power of advanced healthcare.

Advancing Functional Pelvic Imaging: Dynamic MR Urography & Defecography

At the Department of Radio-Diagnosis, Woodlands Hospital, advanced functional MRI techniques are enhancing diagnostic precision in pelvic floor and lower urinary tract disorders. Dynamic MR voiding cystourethrogram provides sequential imaging of bladder emptying during micturition, enabling objective assessment of bladder neck competence and urethral function – vital in cases of incontinence or retention. Complementing this, the MR defecogram evaluates anorectal physiology by documenting rectal evacuation patterns, offering critical insights in chronic constipation, IBS, or pelvic floor dysfunction. By visualizing physiology in motion, these techniques uncover abnormalities invisible on static imaging, supporting accurate diagnosis, multidisciplinary planning, and individualized therapeutic strategies.
